Nursing research has the power to shape EU policy making into something with a stronger focus on evidence-based decision making. The ENRF is ready to serve as a platform for these researchers to coordinate with each other and to obtain information on the latest news and funds relating to the nursing profession. It is key that we all take on this endeavour together to improve the lives of patients and people across Europe.

We are living in times in which our healthcare systems are under growing pressures coming from several factors – ageing populations, the rise of people living with chronic diseases, comorbidities, and more. Nurses, by default, are used to embracing innovation in healthcare as far as it is fit-for-purpose and leads to people-centred-care. Nursing researchers are in the privileged position of being between those two "worlds", bridging innovation to clinical practice, and ensuring its right adoption.

Moreover, the European Parliament, together with the European Commission, is fine-tuning the next research programme of the EU: Horizon Europe. For this research and innovation framework programme an initial agreement between institutions has been signed. This programme will provide €100 billion to fund research in the EU, for the period 2021-2017.

The ENRF continues committed informing and influencing the European Commission and European Parliament and as such bringing nursing research to the frontline of excellence and impact.

The future objectives for EU-funded research and innovation

The ENRF participated in an open consultation by the European Commission on the future objectives for EU-funded research and innovation. With the interest of nursing researchers in mind, the input provided in this consultation aimed at identifying the most pressing challenges that EU-funded research and innovation should tackle in the upcoming future. The outcome of this consultation is expected to shape the distribution of funds within the upcoming Horizon Europe programme. Further details on this consultation are available <u>here</u>.

EU Health Programme

The EU Health Programme is a funding instrument of the EU fostering cooperation among the EU Members States with the aim of further fostering and developing EU health activities. The third edition of the EU Health Programme has a budget of \leq 449.4 million, and will cover the timeframe 2021-2027.

Last October, a high-level conference on the EU Health Programme was organised in Brussels, with the presence of the outgoing EU Commissioner for Health Vytenis Andriukaitis, and the Deputy Director-General of DG Sante, Martin Seychell. The ENRF was present at this event, networking with EU and healthcare stakeholders, highlighting the importance of investing in nursing research to tackle the health problems of the EU's population, and exploring ways for nursing researchers to get EU funds that benefit them. 


Figure: "Few innovations in healthcare"



Top networkers in Horizon 2020

The <u>Horizon 2020 research programme</u> requires that partners build strong transnational consortiums before applying for research funds. That is, only collaborative projects including several countries can be accepted for funding. However, data show that some countries are more proactive and successful than others when building these. The most common collaborations include Germany, France, the UK, Italy, and Spain.

Of course, this brings an opportunity for nursing researchers at those countries to build alliances and get enrolled in consortiums applying for EU funds. However, nursing researchers from smaller countries should also get more active in getting these funds, whether if they build alliances among them, or with bigger more experienced players.

In the following chart, you can see some interesting patterns on which countries are keener to collaborate with who.




Figure: "Structure of the Horizon 2020 collaboration network"

Research funding agencies in central Europe team up to boost regional cooperation

The <u>Austrian Science Fund</u>, the <u>Czech Science Foundation</u>, <u>Poland's</u> <u>National Science Centre</u> and the <u>Slovenian Research Agency</u> have all formed a new partnership with the aim to boost research cooperation in their countries via joint funding and the evaluation of cross-border research projects. This new partnership has been named as the Central European Science Partnership (CEUS). These four agencies have agreed on opening the way for researchers in central Europe to form cross-border collaborations and propose bilateral or trilateral research projects.
